

A Message from Fr Tom

I have a friend whose birthday is on the 14th February. This is great for me as I can never forget it, unlike most of my friend's birthdays. This year Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday coincide. My friend is a plugged-in Catholic and I know she will be engaging with the fasting and abstinence asked of us by the church on Ash Wednesday—that makes for a bizarre birthday. I have some idea of her going to a restaurant to celebrate with a glass of water! The coincidence of Valentine's Day with Ash Wednesday throws up many possibilities if you want to engage faithfully with the church's guidelines on fasting and abstinence (see back page). It actually makes for the perfect date, you bring your loved one to Mass on Ash Wednesday evening and dine on the food of eternal life! What's more you save on the meal, which means you tick the fasting box, and then you can give the money saved to charity which means you tick the almsgiving box. It is a win win. You spend time with your loved one too. What could be better? As we approach Lent, I find myself comparing our observances with those of our Muslim brothers and sisters.

I think I have some type of religious inferiority complex. When I think of Ramadan, the words discipline, meaningful, significant, hardcore, serious all come to mind. It sounds really testing and probably involves a lot of faith to do it properly. If you don't know, a Muslim will forego both eating and drinking (even water) during the hours of sunlight for a month. This of course means that many will fill up early in the morning and in the evening but, nonetheless, it is something to admire. When I think of Lent, the words that come to my mind are not about what it is meant to be but about what it has seemed to have become, not serious, lite, inconvenient, excuse, habit, routine. I wonder if anyone would look at the Catholic community in Western Europe and feel inspired by Lent, maybe, but one of its main tenants, fasting, has become a lost

treasure, seemingly the reserve of spiritual elites like monks or cloistered nuns or of the fanatical who take their faith too seriously.

Lenten practice is not a sectarian competition, they do this so we must do that, nor is it a feat to be achieved. True fasting and abstinence is something we undertake in relationship with God, we do it in his grace and through his strength. That is the point of it, not to prove something of ourselves but to make ourselves a little more vulnerable and more in need of God's presence in our lives. It's purpose is to make a deeper space for God in our lives and to be renewed by his power and love. I am very attached to my creature comforts, now with the able help of Alexa, my virtual assistant, I don't even need to leave the sofa to dim the lights! I like many have been softened by Western luxury, comfort and convenience but Lent offers us an opportunity to tap into something deeper, a spiritual practice going back thousands of years that can help us connect with the eternal, with our creator, with our origins. If the thought of fasting unsettles you, good - it is simple but challenging, it says I am not the centre of the world. It points to the existence to one who is above all and the source of all. With God's grace, let us make this Lent a time of renewal and return to the source. That we may be truly alive to the love of God.

Lent 2018

Ash Wednesday: Ash Wednesday, 14th February 2018, is the Church's solemn call to keep the season of Lent. We accept this call united with the catechumens and recalling our own baptism as we enter this special time of prayer and penitential practice. Lent is not simply a time of personal devotion and renewal. It is a time of community renewal as we seek to renew hearts and souls together. Ashes are blessed and distributed after the homily of the Mass, opening this season of sorrow and mercy. These ashes will be ritually washed away in the new waters of the Easter Vigil. These ashes are of branches of the olive, palm or other tree, which have been blessed on Palm Sunday, the previous year.

Fasting is observed by all 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed. Parents should ensure that even those who are still too young to be bound by the laws of fasting and abstinence are trained to have a true appreciation of penance.

Abstinence is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence, no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted. Almsgiving in conjunction with fast and abstinence and linked with a greater intensity in prayer opens our awareness to the needs of others for whom fasting and abstinence are a way of life by virtue of their socio-economic status. For those of us who have the privilege of being able to fast and abstain, we do so in solidarity with our less fortunate sisters and brothers throughout the world, and unite our sacrifice with theirs in interceding to the Lord for peace in our time.

Year of Mission



Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time & First Sunday in Lent

During this *Year of Mission*, Fr Christopher from the Diocese's Department for Adult Education and Evangelisation shares these thoughts with us:

Sixth Sunday of The Year

This Sunday's gospel, like last week's, is a touching encounter – the physical touch of a leper... an untouchable. This is a life changing encounter for the leper and a transformation from a nobody into a someone; from being outside to a re-joining of community and society; from a life that is a kind of half-life to the gift of re-newed life. 'Of course I want to!' says Jesus. And Jesus risks everything by touching the leper, by reaching out to him. It is amazing how a simple outreach towards others who feel forgotten and ignored can bring them back to life. Pope Francis reminds us that no one is excluded from what the Lord brings but, like Jesus reaching out to the leper, it means taking a risk! Let this coming week be a 'risky' week where you find yourself drawing others into love of God through the outreach you offer.

First Sunday of Lent

We've begun our Lenten pilgrimage and this first Sunday of Lent sends us back into the wilderness. Mark's account is short and to the point. He tells us that Jesus 'was with the wild beasts'. As we face the truth of our lives, as we seek to embrace the challenge and invitation of Jesus' own call, 'Repent', we have to face those demons, those wild beasts within. These are the things that need our focus and our attention during this season of renewal and growth – taming these wild things within us; letting go of the 'wild' things so that we grow to become more the person God calls us to be. But Jesus' first words in Mark's gospel also reveal to us the message we proclaim as missionary disciples: God's kingdom is near, God is near. May this first week of Lent allow God's nearness to come to those around us through the God we reveal in our words and our actions.
