I am going to invite you to stretch your imagination, just a little bit. Imagine in this moment now that you had no TV, no radio, no newspaper, computer or smartphone. Just imagine. Now without any of the above ask, would you know anything about or even have heard of the corona virus? The most you may have heard would be that in a part of China or in the north of Italy there was a flu that caused pneumonia in older people. That might be it. Life would go on as normal and eventually you might hear of a few people in England with it. But if we stop imagining and we add back the TV, the radio, the newspaper, our computers and smartphone we have wall to wall coverage of the virus and it's subsequent disease, all day every day. Not only do we have ceaseless coverage but we have scary graphics of big red ugly virus cells, death counts and the increasing numbers of the sick. Without media we have no panic, with wall to wall coverage, panic has set in.

Please do not think for a moment that I am a Corona Virus denier, I am far from it. I actually can't get enough of the coverage. The Prime minister has declared it the biggest public health crisis in a generation. It is like a 'real world' live disaster movie or virus computer game, but just more captivating because we don't know what will happen next. Three weeks ago I went out panic buying, I bought extra cat food, a leg of lamb and a joint of beef. No dried pasta or baked beans for me. I reason I could live off of a leg of lamb for a week if the apocalypse arrives. Fortunately I had just bulk ordered a box of environmentally friendly, bamboo loo roll so that was one item off of my panic list. While the situation is very serious for the elderly and those with 'underlying medical conditions' like my parents I can't help feel that the panic and fear that has arisen is worse than the actual virus and it's subsequent disease. Of course we don't know how it will develop and it could be really bad but at the moment things do not seem as bad as the panic would suggest.

What appears to be the most significant dis-ease is that of a human race which has forgotten both its creator and its mortality. This virus is one of the few serious things we cannot control. Through economics we have arrived at some semblance of a world better (not necessarily fairer) than it used to be. We have eradicated many diseases known to man and have conquered the skies and even space. It seems that modern man has been feeling invincible. But of course we are not. Far from it. Maybe the Corona Virus Disease gives us a small insight into how vulnerable every generation of humanity has felt until a century ago with a sense that you could die any moment. If you lived in a world where that seemed true then a healthy acceptance of death and a firm faith would be par for the course. We seem to live in a culture that cannot talk about death nor one that has much use for God. I pray this virus and it's subsequent disease does not cause significant harm but so far the dis-ease seems to be more our own fear of a death from something we cannot control. Maybe Covid19 is an invitation to us all to grow in faith and prepare well for our death, for whenever and however it may occur. Fr Tom

### **3RD SUNDAY OF LENT**
